

CELEBRATING MOTHER TONGUE DAY

On 14 March, we celebrated Mother Tongue Day at school. As part of this, students wrote an e-dictation in their classrooms and the library.

During the 4th lesson, 11th and 12th-grade students met with **writer Valdur Mikita** in the Aula, who discussed the Estonian language and the mind. The meeting was conducted by students from the literature module.



An exhibition dedicated to the Book Year and Mother Tongue Day is open on the 3rd floor of the school.

In 2025, it will be 500 years since the publication of the first Estonian-language book. As part of this, students from our school's literature module have prepared an exhibition displaying various books, which can be viewed starting on 14 March, Mother Tongue Day, on the third floor next to class 306.

The exhibition consists of **four parts. "Estonia in Heart"** presents several works by Estonian writers from abroad that can be found in the school library. They were published abroad for the first time but were nevertheless written in Estonian, which is close to the author's heart. "MHG in Heart" is a collection of works completed as part of practical work by both basic and secondary school students. The showcase titled "Lend Me Your Harp, Vanemuine..." provides an overview of the publications of "Kalevipoeg" from 1885 to 2014 – the epic's prints range from culturally valuable relics to modern picture books or graphic novels. "Helgi's Dustiest Books" brings together the twelve oldest books in the school library, several of which have school stamps removed or cut out and names censored in black ink.

9th-graders organized a state budget simulation as part of the Social Studies subject, where they had to figure out the necessary budget cut plan since the state budget had been cut to 1 billion. The simulation consisted of two parts: preparation and debate. In the preparation, the students were divided into small groups, and each group was assigned to represent one ministry. Each ministry was given time to prepare a memo on how much money they needed and what it would be spent on. They also had to formulate the importance of the ministry and its tasks.

Each ministry chose a minister who could speak and vote on behalf of the ministry. The remaining group members were advisors; they did not have the right to speak but could support the minister with ideas. At the beginning of the debate, each minister had 3 minutes to speak on behalf of their ministry, convey their goals and specify the importance of their ministry. Then, the ministers could talk and share their opinions on possible cutback plans with others. When most ministries had further increased their cuts and reached a smaller budget, the Ministry of Finance conducted an interim review, which revealed that the state budget was in tatters. After the interim report from the Ministry of Finance, each ministry had 1 minute to specify the current situation: how much and where the money was being spent. After the reports, the budgets of each ministry were reviewed for the last time, and if a minister had an idea for a budget cutback plan, a vote was held. If more than half of the ministries voted in favour of the proposal, the proposal passed, and a certain amount of money was taken from the ministry. At the end of the debate, it became clear whether the budget passed or failed.

The 9b simulation was very heated but exciting. Most ministries had to cut more than half their recommended budget, leading to significant sacrifices. For example, the Ministry of Education and Research had to accept 1% of the 2025 state budget. This meant that all schools were closed and switched to elearning. This way, there was no need to spend money on utility costs, and fewer teachers were teaching hundreds of students at work. This also meant that less money was spent on teachers' salaries. Reaching such a decision meant the e-learning problem caused by the epidemic wave over 5 years ago was not a problem for decent and self-directed students.
